

The Fifth Sunday after Epiphany

Habakkuk 1:12--2:4, 9-14

Art thou not from everlasting, O LORD my God, mine Holy One? we shall not die. O LORD, thou hast ordained them for judgment; and, O mighty God, thou hast established them for correction. Thou art of purer eyes than to behold evil, and canst not look on iniquity: wherefore lookest thou upon them that deal treacherously, and holdest thy tongue when the wicked devoureth the man that is more righteous than he? And makest men as the fishes of the sea, as the creeping things, that have no ruler over them? They take up all of them with the angle, they catch them in their net, and gather them in their drag: therefore they rejoice and are glad. Therefore they sacrifice unto their net, and burn incense unto their drag; because by them their portion is fat, and their meat plenteous. Shall they therefore empty their net, and not spare continually to slay the nations? I will stand upon my watch, and set me upon the tower, and will watch to see what he will say unto me, and what I shall answer when I am reproved. And the LORD answered me, and said, Write the vision, and make it plain upon tables, that he may run that readeth it. For the vision is yet for an appointed time, but at the end it shall speak, and not lie: though it tarry, wait for it; because it will surely come, it will not tarry. Behold, his soul which is lifted up is not upright in him: but the just shall live by his faith. Woe to him that coveteth an evil covetousness to his house, that he may set his nest on high, that he may be delivered from the power of evil! Thou hast consulted shame to thy house by cutting off many people, and hast sinned against thy soul. For the stone shall cry out of the wall, and the beam out of the timber shall answer it. Woe to him that buildeth a town with blood, and stablisheth a city by iniquity! Behold, is it not of the LORD of hosts that the people shall labour in the very fire, and the people shall weary themselves for very vanity? For the earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the LORD, as the waters cover the sea.

LENTEN STUDY 2025: We will begin our parish Lenten study on **Wednesday, February 26** (Week of Sexagesima) at **6 pm**. The office of Evening Prayer will precede the study every week (2/26, 3/12, 3/19, 3/26, 4/2, and 4/9) at 6 pm, with a potluck supper (Lenten fare) to follow and accompany the presentation. This year, our theme will be "The Anglican Rule: Prayer and Devotion in the Prayerbook Tradition," led by Fr. Peter.

SHROVE TUESDAY FESTIVAL: St. Alban's is planning our annual feast on Shrove Tuesday, March 4! STATIONS OF THE CROSS will be observed every Wednesday at noon during Lent.

FAREWELL TO THE ALLELUIAS: The word Alleluia translates to "Praise the Lord" for Christians, and is an expression of great joy. The phrase is uttered often in the Psalms (esp. 111-117), chanted by the saints in heaven in Revelation (chap. 19), and woven throughout our liturgy in various ways from week to week. During the penitential seasons of pre-Lent and Lent, beginning next week, the Alleluias are not said. This underscores the solemnity of this portion of the liturgical year. Today, we will emphasize this point by literally taking them out of the church during our final hymn and burying them until Holy Saturday (Alleluia Saturday), at which time they will be brought back in joyous anticipation of the Great Easter Feast.

YOUTH CAMP: St. Bede's Youth Camp (June 8-13) is a wonderful and unique opportunity for Anglican kids from age 8 to 16! The camp is centered around fellowship, spiritual formation and growth, and outdoor adventures. All electronics are put away for the week as we enjoy communing with God, each other, and nature. Each day at camp the youth participate in the Daily Office and Mass, religious education classes led by APA clergy, and FUN outdoor adventures such as canoeing, swimming and hiking in the mountains of South Carolina.
