

Is it not lawful for me to do what I will with mine own? Is thine eye evil, because I am good? So the last shall be first, and the first last: for many be called, but few chosen.

RETURNING YOUR PALMS: As we enter the pre-Lenten season, please return your palm branches saved from last year and deposit them in the basket in the narthex. They will be burned and used as the ashes applied in worship on Ash Wednesday.

FAREWELL TO THE ALLELUIAS:

The word Alleluia translates to "Praise the Lord" for Christians, and is an expression of great joy. The phrase is uttered often in the Psalms (esp. 111-117), chanted by the saints in heaven in Revelation (chap. 19), and woven throughout our liturgy in various ways from week to week. During the penitential seasons of pre-Lent and Lent, beginning today, the Alleluias are not said. This underscores the solemnity of this portion of the liturgical year until Holy Saturday (Alleluia Saturday) when they will be brought back in joyous anticipation of the Great Easter Feast.

LENTEN STUDY 2025: We will begin our parish Lenten study on **Wednesday, February 26** (Week of Sexagesima) at **6 pm**. The office of Evening Prayer will precede the study every week (2/26, 3/12, 3/19, 3/26, 4/2, and 4/9) at 6 pm, with a potluck supper (Lenten fare) to follow and accompany the presentation. This year, our theme will be "The Anglican Rule: Prayer and Devotion in the Prayerbook Tradition," led by Fr. Peter.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS will be observed every Wednesday at noon during Lent.

SHROVE TUESDAY FESTIVAL: St. Alban's is planning our annual feast on Shrove Tuesday, March 4! This year we're planning to "go big," with traditional pancakes (and pancake races), and we're calling on our parish gourmands to contribute their favorite rich and savory dishes, as we mark the beginning of another Lenten pilgrimage towards the cross and empty tomb. Whether you have volunteered in some capacity in years past, or are interested in contributing something new, please contact Amy Clark (407-920-4365) if you are willing to serve. Pancakes and toppings will be provided by the church, and a sign-up sheet for select items is posted in the courtyard/parish house.

ASH WEDNESDAY falls on **March 5th** this year. We will have mass with the imposition of ashes at **7:00 am, noon** and a high holy mass at **7:00 pm**. "Remember that thou art but dust, and to dust thou shalt return."

HEAD COVERINGS: In the ancient Christian church, it was often a custom of unmarried women and widows to veil themselves in public and at divine service. The wearing of the veil (velamen or flammeum) signified—especially to the unbelieving world—the constancy and loyalty of the faithful Christian woman to Christ alone, as she presented herself thereby as a living instantiation of Christ's Bride, the

Church. The *flammeum Christi* developed, in time, into the distinctive habit of professed religious sisters, but was also adopted in many places (even by married women) as a pious expression of the Church's collective submission and fidelity to Christ its head. The practice is a purely personal and voluntary expression of Christian piety, and is never required as an article of faith or practice.
